Dear Dr. Lederberg,

Thank you for your understanding letter  
and kind invitation to the Osborn Lecture,  
Jan. 16<sup>th</sup> on International Health. I have  
waited until this time to reply in hopes  
that a prior commitment could be rescheduled  
but unfortunately it cannot. It is very hard  
for me to get away before Thursday of each  
week for I am regularly scheduled to  
work full time at I.F.R. Mon.-Wed. Thus,  
meetings get planned way in advance.

For future reference, I do come to the  
city almost every other week on Thurs. & Fri.  
and if ever there were to be a lecture of  
similar appeal I would be most grateful to  
be included in the audience. The particular

one you invited me to really does sound interesting.  
I almost went to a Conference on Health  
with Linus Pauling and others in October but  
various complications arose on the part of the  
conference.

By the way, I believe when we last  
spoke together at lunch, I mentioned to you  
my acquaintance with Norman Cousins. I'm  
enclosing a copy of his latest book for your  
interest if you haven't already read it. It  
may shed an interesting light in regard  
to the up and coming program on health.  
What seems particularly interesting is that  
Medical Communities from all over the U.S.  
have invited him to speak before them (as  
(the first laymen lecturer in many cases.)  
and I find his thesis most convincing,  
if unconventional. In February he's coming

to speak to a group sponsored by the  
Rockefeller Foundation and if you're interested  
I'll let you know when it is.

As a result of my trip to Russia  
in September for the Soviet/American Writers  
Conference, of which Norman Mailer was the  
co-chairman, I have subsequently published  
an article documenting the conference. I realize  
you have very little time but thought you  
might be interested if you like alternative  
reading material. (Alternative to Scratches  
material, I mean.) This is the complete version  
which gives a better feel for the country as  
a whole. I'm sure the tenor would be  
different today given the Russians' recent  
acts of aggression. The shorter version was

just on the Conference itself and was published  
in "The ~~the~~ Authors Guild Bulletin." No  
response is necessary.

I hope that you and Marguerite had  
a restful and happy holiday season. Perhaps  
next summer you can bring your family  
to Shelburne Farms for a weekend. You  
would be most welcome and I believe  
you would find it a pleasant contrast  
to the City.
