Cancer Risks assessment.

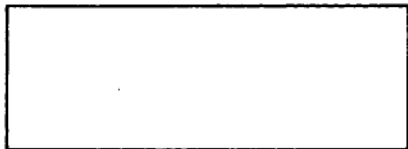
Thank you very much for sharing the draft of a splendid document.

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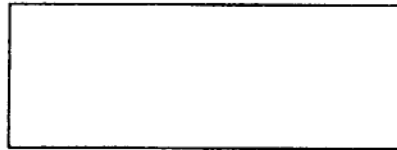
