Could you please explain something which is not clear from reading the newspaper article?

Are the possible mutagenic effects of the vaccine a danger only if the vaccine is given during the first 3 months of pregnancy?

Or does the vaccine, given at any time, possibly cause mutations in egg cells which will affect her future children?
