Dear Mr. Ulanowicz,

Thank you for your comment on my column of April 11th. I certainly did not mean to convey a condemnation of every suggestion that we re-examine the merits of economic growth for I have offered my own criticism on this point, including my column of a few weeks back. I regret that my sentence lends itself to this interpretation but believe that this should not prevail in the face of the rest of the article or even the remainder of that paragraph. Perhaps I do believe that real economic growth is also possible without the distortions of profligate consumption but in any event I would share with you the most profound admiration of anyone who could help us promote social justice and environmental conservation at the same time. My impatience is with those who refuse to see the reconstruction of the cities as a problem of high priority ~~in~~ which we should be concentrating our attention and our economic resources. This is hardly the trickling theory.

Rather than continue a private correspondence may I urge you to recast your opinions as a letter to the editor of The Washington Post. Your point is well taken and can be made without forcing me into a posture that I do not in fact uphold.
