Dear Dr. Woolley,

In your paper "Selective reversible inhibition of microbial growth with pyrithiamine", appearing in the J. Exp. Med., Dec. 1943, I noted your reference to a culture of *S. gallinarum* which required both the thiazole and pyrimidine components of thiamin.

While retesting the nutritional requirements of some of my *Salmonella* cultures, in the nutrition of which I am greatly interested, I noted that my culture of *S. gallinarum*, received from Borman at the Conn. Public Health Labs., responded only to thiazole.

For comparative purposes, and because of my interest in intra-type nutritional variation, I would like to have your *gallinarum* culture, and would greatly appreciate receiving it from you. If you have not kept it going, perhaps you have a culture number that could identify it if I corresponded with Kettger's lab. at Yale.
