Thanks for your note of the 10th and the cultures promised. The Pc230 and Col 529-55 sound as if they would fit in especially well with the "artificial" b,i 's we're studying. You mentioned that the latter was unpublished—should I not write to Joan Taylor and check whether she's doing anything along the lines we have in mind? By the way what's happened to the rule of nat giving new serotypes binomial names? Has it been revised or is it simply not always observed. I'm especially puzzled by seeing Kauffmann's papers.

What I particularly wanted to write you about was whether you could be interested and able to pay us a visit sometime this year. Joe Willon has a project (from army or air force funds, the one Dr. Simon is working on) that ties on quite closely to transduction of serotype in Salmonella, and especially to that question of the '5' antigen. They also have some money with which to pay any travel expenses as well as a "consultation fee" of \$25/day [if you are not barred by your federal employment status]. I was about to suggest that you'd probably want to wait till late spring or summer, but I gather you're colder nowadays than we are!
