Dear Luca,

You will have received my telegram telling you that the proofs of yours & my paper arrived yesterday. There is a printed slip accompanying the proofs which says that typographical corrections only are permitted. I do not know to what extent this may upset your plans to make fairly radical alterations to your paper. The proofs must be in Nov. 24. I feel the best thing would be for you to alter your proof to the extent you originally intended & send it ^{as} ~~it~~ ^{is} ~~you~~ ^{your} ~~paper~~ to the editor. Let me know roughly what you have done. I have already corrected your paper in the ordinary way, including some minor alterations in the setting out of Table 2 which is a bit cramped in the proof. You will note that the proofs are page proofs so that clearly not much can be added or subtracted except at the end of paragraphs — though I expect a footnote would be permissible. Incidentally, I think the typescript I gave you on yellow paper matches the top copy I received with the proofs. Sorry for the trouble & rush — I hadn't expected the proofs for some time yet. Do you want me to order a copy for reprints for you — if so, how many?
