AN ACT

Making appropriations for the Departments of Labor, and Health, Education, and Welfare, and related agencies, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965, and for other purposes.

- 1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*
3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any money
4 in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the Depart-
5 ments of Labor, and Health, Education, and Welfare, and
6 related agencies, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1965,
7 and for other purposes, namely:

1 TITLE I—DEPARTMENT OF LABOR

2 BUREAU OF LABOR STATISTICS

3 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

4 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary for
5 the work of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, including ad-
6 vances or reimbursement to State, Federal, and local agencies
7 and their employees for services rendered, ~~\$18,125,000~~
8 *\$17,625,000.*

9 BUREAU OF INTERNATIONAL LABOR AFFAIRS

10 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

11 For expenses necessary for the conduct of international
12 labor affairs, \$856,000.

13 MANPOWER ADMINISTRATION

14 MANPOWER DEVELOPMENT AND TRAINING ACTIVITIES

15 For expenses necessary to carry into effect the Man-
16 power Development and Training Act of 1962, as amended
17 (42 U.S.C. 2571-2620), and for the performance of the
18 functions of the Secretary in the fields of automation and
19 manpower, ~~\$327,906,000~~, to be immediately available
20 *\$307,906,000.*

21 AREA REDEVELOPMENT ACTIVITIES

22 For expenses necessary to carry into effect sections 16
23 and 17 of the Area Redevelopment Act (Public Law 87-
24 27), including grants or reimbursements to States, \$8,-
25 500,000.

1 TRADE ADJUSTMENT ACTIVITIES

2 For necessary expenses to carry out the functions of the
3 Secretary of Labor under the Trade Expansion Act of 1962,
4 ~~\$344,000~~ \$160,000.

5 BUREAU OF APPRENTICESHIP AND TRAINING

6 For expenses necessary to enable the Secretary to con-
7 duct a program of encouraging apprentice training, as author-
8 ized by the Acts of March 4, 1913 (5 U.S.C. 611), and
9 August 16, 1937 (29 U.S.C. 50), \$5,541,000.

10 LIMITATION ON SALARIES AND EXPENSES, BUREAU OF
11 EMPLOYMENT SECURITY

12 For expenses necessary for the general administration of
13 the employment service and unemployment compensation
14 programs, not more than \$13,325,000 may be expended from
15 the employment security administration account in the Un-
16 employment trust fund, of which \$1,605,000 shall be for
17 carrying into effect the provisions of title IV (except section
18 602) of the Servicemen's Readjustment Act of 1944.

19 LIMITATION ON GRANTS TO STATES FOR UNEMPLOYMENT
20 COMPENSATION AND EMPLOYMENT SERVICE ADMIN-
21 ISTRATION

22 For grants in accordance with the provisions of the Act
23 of June 6, 1933, as amended (29 U.S.C. 49-49n), for
24 carrying into effect section 602 of the Servicemen's Re-
25 adjustment Act of 1944, for grants to the States as author-

1 ized in title III of the Social Security Act, as amended
2 (42 U.S.C. 501-503), including, upon the request of any
3 State, the purchase of equipment, and the payment of rental
4 for space made available to such State in lieu of grants for
5 such purpose, and for expenses not otherwise provided for,
6 necessary for carrying out title XV of the Social Security
7 Act, as amended (68 Stat. 1130), \$455,076,000 may be ex-
8 pended from the employment security administration account
9 in the Unemployment trust fund, and of which ~~\$30,000,000~~
10 ~~\$22,000,000~~ shall be available only to the extent necessary
11 to meet increased costs of administration resulting *from*
12 *increases in the base salary rate in excess of the rate in the*
13 *fiscal year 1965 appropriation request, and from changes in a*
14 *State law or increases in the number of claims filed and claims*
15 *paid or increased salary costs resulting from changes in*
16 *State salary compensation plans embracing employees of*
17 *the State generally over those upon which the State's basic*
18 *grant (or the allocation for the District of Columbia) was*
19 *based, which increased costs of administration cannot be*
20 *provided for by normal budgetary adjustments: Provided,*
21 *That any portion of the funds granted to a State in the current*
22 *fiscal year and not obligated by the State in that year shall*
23 *be returned to the Treasury and credited to the account from*
24 *which derived: Provided further, That such amounts as may*
25 *be agreed upon by the Department of Labor and the Post*

1 Office Department shall be used for the payment, in such
2 manner as said parties may jointly determine, of postage for
3 the transmission of official mail matter in connection with the
4 administration of unemployment compensation systems and
5 employment services by States receiving grants herefrom.

6 Grants to States, next succeeding fiscal year: For mak-
7 ing, after May 31 of the current fiscal year, payments to
8 States under title III of the Social Security Act, as
9 amended, and under the Act of June 6, 1933, as amended,
10 for the first quarter of the next succeeding fiscal year, such
11 sums as may be necessary, the obligations incurred and the
12 expenditures made thereunder for payments under such title
13 and under such Act of June 6, 1933, to be charged to the
14 appropriation therefor for that fiscal year: *Provided*, That
15 the payments made pursuant to this paragraph shall not
16 exceed the amount paid to the States for the first quarter
17 of the current fiscal year.

18 UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION FOR FEDERAL

19 EMPLOYEES AND EX-SERVICEMEN

20 For payments to unemployed Federal employees and
21 ex-servicemen, as authorized by title XV of the Social
22 Security Act, as amended, \$126,000,000.

23 Unemployment compensation for Federal employees and
24 ex-servicemen, next succeeding fiscal year: For making, after
25 May 31 of the current fiscal year payments to States, as

1 authorized by title XV of the Social Security Act, as
2 amended, such amounts as may be required for payment to
3 unemployed Federal employees and ex-servicemen for the
4 first quarter of the next succeeding fiscal year, and the obli-
5 gations and expenditures thereunder shall be charged to the
6 appropriation therefor for that fiscal year: *Provided*, That the
7 payments made pursuant to this paragraph shall not exceed
8 the amount paid to the States for the first quarter of the
9 current fiscal year.

10 COMPLIANCE ACTIVITIES, MEXICAN FARM LABOR PROGRAM

11 For expenses necessary to enable the Department to
12 determine compliance with the provisions of contracts entered
13 into pursuant to the Act of July 12, 1951, as amended,
14 \$800,000.

15 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, MEXICAN FARM LABOR
16 PROGRAM

17 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary to
18 carry out the functions of the Department of Labor under
19 the Act of July 12, 1951, as amended (7 U.S.C. 1461-
20 1468), including temporary employment of persons without
21 regard to the civil-service laws, \$800,000, or so much
22 thereof as may be available, shall be derived by transfer
23 from the Farm labor supply revolving fund.

1 LABOR-MANAGEMENT RELATIONS

2 LABOR-MANAGEMENT SERVICES ADMINISTRATION

3 For necessary expenses to carry out the provisions of the
4 Welfare and Pension Plans Disclosure Act, as amended (72
5 Stat. 997), the Labor-Management Reporting and Disclosure
6 Act of 1959 (73 Stat. 519), expenses of commissions and
7 boards to resolve labor-management disputes and other ex-
8 penses for improving the climate of labor-management re-
9 lations, ~~\$7,352,000~~ \$7,502,000.

10 BUREAU OF VETERANS' REEMPLOYMENT RIGHTS

11 For expenses necessary to render assistance in connec-
12 tion with the exercise of reemployment rights under section 8
13 of the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, as
14 amended (50 U.S.C. App. 308), the Service Extension Act
15 of 1941, as amended (50 U.S.C. App. 351), the Army Re-
16 serve and Retired Personnel Service Law of 1940, as
17 amended (50 U.S.C. App. 401), and section 9 of the
18 Universal Military Training and Service Act (50 U.S.C.
19 App. 459), and the Reserve Forces Act of 1955 (69 Stat.
20 598), \$791,000.

1 WAGE AND LABOR STANDARDS

2 BUREAU OF LABOR STANDARDS

3 For expenses necessary for the promotion of industrial
4 safety, employment stabilization, and amicable industrial
5 relations for labor and industry; performance of safety func-
6 tions of the Secretary under the Federal Employees' Com-
7 pensation Act, as amended (5 U.S.C. 784(c)) and the
8 Longshoremen's and Harbor Workers' Compensation Act,
9 as amended (72 Stat. 835); and not less than \$309,300
10 for the work of the President's Committee on Employment
11 of the Handicapped, as authorized by the Act of July 11,
12 1949 (63 Stat. 409); \$3,516,000: *Provided*, That no part
13 of the appropriation for the President's Committee shall be
14 subject to reduction or transfer to any other department or
15 agency under the provisions of any existing law; including
16 purchase of reports and of material for informational exhibits.

17 WOMEN'S BUREAU

18 For expenses necessary for the work of the Women's
19 Bureau, as authorized by the Act of June 5, 1920 (29
20 U.S.C. 11-16), including purchase of reports and material
21 for informational exhibits, \$772,000.

22 WAGE AND HOUR DIVISION

23 For expenses necessary for performing the duties im-
24 posed by the Fair Labor Standards Act of 1938, as amended,
25 and the Act to provide conditions for the purchase of supplies

1 and the making of contracts by the United States, approved
 2 June 30, 1936, as amended (41 U.S.C. 35-45), including
 3 reimbursements to State, Federal, and local agencies and
 4 their employees for inspection services rendered, \$20,-
 5 378,000.

6 EMPLOYEES' COMPENSATION

7 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, BUREAU OF EMPLOYEES'
 8 COMPENSATION

9 For necessary administrative expenses and not to exceed
 10 \$113,600 for the Employees' Compensation Appeals Board,
 11 \$4,368,000, together with not to exceed \$60,000 to be
 12 derived from the fund created by section 44 of the Long-
 13 shoremen's and Harbor Workers' Compensation Act, as
 14 amended (33 U.S.C. 944).

15 EMPLOYEES' COMPENSATION CLAIMS AND EXPENSES

16 For the payment of compensation and other benefits
 17 and expenses (except administrative expenses) authorized by
 18 law and accruing during the current or any prior fiscal year,
 19 including payments to other Federal agencies for medical and
 20 hospital services pursuant to agreement approved by the
 21 Bureau of Employees' Compensation; continuation of pay-
 22 ment of benefits as provided for under the head "Civilian War
 23 Benefits" in the Federal Security Agency Appropriation
 24 Act, 1947; the advancement of costs for enforcement of re-

1 coveries in third-party cases; the furnishing of medical and
2 hospital services and supplies, treatment, and funeral and
3 burial expenses, including transportation and other expenses
4 incidental to such services, treatment, and burial, for such
5 enrollees of the Civilian Conservation Corps as were certified
6 by the Director of such Corps as receiving hospital services
7 and treatment at Government expense on June 30, 1943, and
8 who are not otherwise entitled thereto as civilian employees
9 of the United States, and the limitations and authority of the
10 Act of September 7, 1916, as amended (5 U.S.C. 796),
11 shall apply in providing such services, treatment, and ex-
12 penses in such cases and for payments pursuant to sections
13 4 (c) and 5 (f) of the War Claims Act of 1948 (50 U.S.C.
14 App. 2012) ; \$52,650,000, together with such amount as
15 may be necessary to be charged to the subsequent year
16 appropriation for the payment of compensation and other
17 benefits for any period subsequent to March 31 of the
18 year: *Provided*, That, in the adjudication of claims under
19 section 42 of the said Act of 1916, for benefits payable
20 from this appropriation, authority under section 32 of the
21 Act to make rules and regulations shall be construed to
22 include the nature and extent of the proofs and evidence
23 required to establish the right to such benefits without regard
24 to the date of the injury or death for which claim is made.

1 OFFICE OF THE SOLICITOR

2 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

3 For expenses necessary for the Office of the Solicitor,
4 \$4,857,000, together with not to exceed \$132,000 to be
5 derived from the Employment Security Administration
6 account, Unemployment Trust Fund.

7 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

8 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

9 For expenses necessary for the Office of the Secretary
10 of Labor, \$3,198,000, together with not to exceed \$139,000
11 to be derived from the Employment Security Administration
12 account, Unemployment Trust Fund.

13 This title may be cited as the "Department of Labor
14 Appropriation Act, 1965".

15 TITLE II—DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH, EDUCA-
16 TION, AND WELFARE

17 FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION

18 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

19 For necessary expenses not otherwise provided for, of
20 the Food and Drug Administration, including reporting and
21 illustrating the results of investigations; purchase of chemi-
22 cals, apparatus, and scientific equipment; payment in ad-
23 vance for special tests and analyses and adverse reaction
24 reporting by contract; payment of fees, travel, and per diem

1 in connection with studies of new developments pertinent to
2 food and drug enforcement operations; compensation of in-
3 formers; payment for publication of technical and informa-
4 tional materials in professional and trade journals; and rental
5 of special purpose space in the District of Columbia or else-
6 where; \$39,200,000.

7

BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

8 For construction, alteration, and equipment, of facilities,
9 including acquisition of sites, and planning, architectural, and
10 engineering services, \$10,875,000, to remain available until
11 expended.

OFFICE OF EDUCATION

13

EXPANSION AND IMPROVEMENT OF VOCATIONAL

14

EDUCATION

15 For carrying out the provisions of titles I and II of the
16 Vocational Education Act of 1946, as amended (20 U.S.C.
17 15i-15m, 15o-15q, 15aa-15jj, Public Law 88-210), section
18 1 of the Act of March 3, 1931 (20 U.S.C. 30), the Act of
19 March 18, 1950 (20 U.S.C. 31-33), section 9 of the Act
20 of August 1, 1956 (20 U.S.C. 34), section 2 of the Act
21 of September 25, 1962 (48 U.S.C. 1667), and the Voca-
22 tional Education Act of 1963; ~~\$183,296,000, to be immedi-~~
23 ~~ately available~~ \$158,296,000, of which \$5,000,000 shall be
24 for allotment for practical nurse training under such title II

1 of the Vocational Education Act of 1946, \$180,000 for
2 vocational education in the fishery trades and industry in-
3 cluding distributive occupations therein, and ~~\$30,000,000~~
4 ~~for carrying out sections 13 and 14~~ \$5,000,000 for carrying
5 out section 13 of the Vocational Education Act of 1963,
6 and \$118,500,000 for carrying out other provisions of that
7 Act.

8 HIGHER EDUCATION FACILITIES CONSTRUCTION

9 For grants, loans, and payments under the Higher Edu-
10 cation Facilities Act of 1963, \$463,150,000, to be immedi-
11 ately available, of which not to exceed \$230,000,000 shall
12 be for grants for construction of academic facilities under
13 title I; \$60,000,000 shall be for grants for construction of
14 graduate academic facilities under title II; and \$169,-
15 250,000 shall be for loans for construction of academic
16 facilities under title III.

17 GRANTS FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIES

18 *For grants to the States, pursuant to the Act of June*
19 *19, 1956, as amended (20 U.S.C. 351-358; Public Law*
20 *88-269), \$55,000,000, of which \$25,000,000 shall be for*
21 *grants for public library services under title I of such Act,*
22 *and \$30,000,000 shall be for grants for public library con-*
23 *struction under title II of such Act.*

1 FURTHER ENDOWMENT OF COLLEGES OF AGRICULTURE AND
2 THE MECHANIC ARTS

3 For carrying out the provisions of section 22 of the Act
4 of June 29, 1935, as amended (7 U.S.C. 329), \$11,950,-
5 000.

6 PAYMENTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

7 For payments to local educational agencies for the
8 maintenance and operation of schools as authorized by the
9 Act of September 30, 1950, as amended (20 U.S.C., ch.
10 13), ~~\$359,450,000~~ \$332,000,000: *Provided*, That this ap-
11 propriation shall also be available for carrying out the pro-
12 visions of section 6 of such Act.

13 ASSISTANCE FOR SCHOOL CONSTRUCTION

14 For an additional amount for providing school facilities
15 and for grants to local educational agencies in federally
16 affected areas, as authorized by the Act of September 23,
17 1950, as amended (20 U.S.C., ch. 19), including not to
18 exceed \$820,000 for necessary expenses during the current
19 fiscal year of technical services rendered by other agencies,
20 \$58,400,000, to be immediately available, and to remain
21 available until expended: *Provided*, That no part of this ap-
22 propriation shall be available for salaries or other direct ex-
23 penses of the Department of Health, Education, and Wel-
24 fare : *Provided further*, That applications filed on or before

1 June 30, 1964, shall receive priority over applications filed
2 after such date.

3 DEFENSE EDUCATIONAL ACTIVITIES

4 For grants, loans, and payments under the National De-
5 fense Education Act of 1958 (72 Stat. 1580-1605), \$287-
6 853,000, of which \$136,000,000 shall be for capital con-
7 tributions to student loan funds and loans for non-Federal
8 capital contributions to student loan funds, of which not to
9 exceed \$1,000,000 shall be for such loans for non-Federal
10 capital contributions, \$66,600,000 shall be for grants to
11 States and loans to nonprofit private schools for science,
12 mathematics, or modern language equipment and minor re-
13 modeling of facilities and for grants to States for supervisory
14 and other services: *Provided*, That allotments under sections
15 302 (a) and 305 for acquisition of equipment and minor re-
16 modeling shall be made on the basis of \$61,600,000 for
17 grants to States and shall be made on the basis of \$8,400,000
18 for loans to private, nonprofit schools, and allotments under
19 section 302 (b) for supervisory and other services shall be
20 made on the basis of \$5,000,000; \$15,000,000 shall be for
21 grants to States for area vocational education programs; and
22 \$17,500,000 shall be for grants to States for testing, guid-
23 ance, and counseling: *Provided*, That no part of this appro-
24 priation shall be available for the purchase of science,

1 mathematics, and modern language teaching equipment, or
2 equipment suitable for use for teaching in such fields of edu-
3 cation, which can be identified as originating in or having
4 been exported from a Communist country, unless such equip-
5 ment is unavailable from any other source: *Provided fur-*
6 *ther*, That no part of this appropriation shall be available for
7 graduate fellowships awarded initially under the provisions
8 of the Act after the date of enactment of the Department
9 of Health, Education, and Welfare Appropriation Act, 1962,
10 which are not found by the Commissioner of Education to
11 be consistent with the purpose of the Act as stated in
12 section 101 thereof.

13 Loans and payments under the National Defense Educa-
14 tion Act, next succeeding fiscal year: For making, after March
15 31 of the current fiscal year, loans and payments under title
16 II of the National Defense Education Act, for the first
17 quarter of the next succeeding fiscal year such sums as may
18 be necessary, the obligations incurred and the expenditures
19 made thereunder to be charged to the appropriation for the
20 same purpose for that fiscal year: *Provided*, That the pay-
21 ments made pursuant to this paragraph shall not exceed the
22 amount paid for the same purposes for the first quarter of
23 the current fiscal year.

1 EDUCATIONAL IMPROVEMENT FOR THE HANDICAPPED

2 For grants for training and research and demonstrations
3 with respect to handicapped children pursuant to the Act
4 of September 6, 1958, as amended (20 U.S.C. 611-617),
5 and section 302 of the Mental Retardation Facilities and
6 Community Mental Health Centers Construction Act of
7 1963 (Public Law 88-164), \$16,500,000.

8 COOPERATIVE RESEARCH

9 For cooperative research, surveys, and demonstrations
10 in education as authorized by the Act of July 26, 1954
11 (20 U.S.C. 331-332), \$15,840,000.

12 EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH (SPECIAL FOREIGN CURRENCY
13 PROGRAM)

14 For payments in foreign currencies which the Treasury
15 Department determines to be excess to the normal require-
16 ments of the United States, for necessary expenses of the
17 Office of Education, as authorized by law, \$500,000, to re-
18 main available until expended: *Provided*, That this appro-
19 priation shall be available, in addition to other appropria-
20 tions to such agency, for payments in the foregoing cur-
21 rencies.

1 FOREIGN LANGUAGE TRAINING AND AREA STUDIES

2 For payments to carry out the provisions of section 102
3 (b) (6) of the Mutual Educational and Cultural Exchange
4 Act of 1961 (75 Stat. 529), \$1,500,000.

5 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

6 For expenses necessary for the Office of Education, in-
7 cluding surveys, studies, investigations, and reports regarding
8 libraries; coordination of library service on the national level
9 with other forms of adult education; development of library
10 service throughout the country; purchase, distribution, and
11 exchange of education documents, motion-picture films, and
12 lantern slides; ~~\$18,599,000~~ to be immediately available
13 \$18,699,000.

14 VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION

15 ADMINISTRATION

16 GRANTS TO STATES

17 For grants to States in accordance with the Vocational
18 Rehabilitation Act, as amended, \$100,100,000, of which
19 \$97,100,000 is for vocational rehabilitation services under
20 section 2 of said Act; and \$3,000,000 is for extension and
21 improvement projects under section 3 of said Act: *Provided,*
22 That allotments under section 2 of said Act to the States for
23 the current fiscal year shall be made on the basis of \$175,-
24 000,000, and this amount shall be considered the sum avail-
25 able for allotments under such section for such fiscal year:

1 *Provided further*, That additional allotments, not exceeding
2 \$900,000 in the aggregate, for grants under section 2 of
3 said Act may be made, in accordance with regulations of
4 the Secretary, to States in which the Federal share of the
5 costs of rehabilitation services under such section exceeds
6 their respective allotments from such \$175,000,000: *Pro-*
7 *vided further*, That the allotment to any State under section
8 3 (a) (1) of said Act shall be not less than \$15,000.

9 Grants to States, next succeeding fiscal year: For mak-
10 ing, after May 31, of the current fiscal year, grants to States
11 under sections 2 and 3 of the Vocational Rehabilitation Act,
12 as amended, for the first quarter of the next succeeding fiscal
13 year such sums as may be necessary, the obligations incurred
14 and the expenditures made thereunder to be charged
15 to the appropriation therefor for that fiscal year: *Provided*,
16 That the payments made pursuant to this paragraph shall
17 not exceed the amount paid to the States for the first quar-
18 ter of the current fiscal year.

19 RESEARCH AND TRAINING

20 For grants and other expenses (except administrative
21 expenses) for research, training, traineeships, and other
22 special projects, pursuant to section 4 of the Vocational Re-
23 habilitation Act, as amended, for carrying out the training
24 functions provided for in section 7 of said Act, for studies,
25 investigations, demonstrations, and reports, and of dissemina-

1 tion of information with respect thereto pursuant to section
2 7 of said Act, and not to exceed \$100,000 for carrying out
3 the functions of the Vocational Rehabilitation Administra-
4 tion under the International Health Research Act of 1960
5 (74 Stat. 364), ~~\$40,565,000~~ \$41,065,000.

6 RESEARCH AND TRAINING (SPECIAL FOREIGN CURRENCY
7 PROGRAM)

8 For payments in foreign currencies which the Treasury
9 Department determines to be excess to the normal require-
10 ments of the United States, for necessary expenses of the
11 Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, as authorized by
12 law, \$2,000,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
13 *vided*, That this appropriation shall be available, in addition
14 to other appropriations to such agency, for the payments
15 in the foregoing currencies.

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For expenses, not otherwise provided for, necessary for
18 the Vocational Rehabilitation Administration, \$3,140,000.

19 PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICE

20 PREAMBLE

21 For necessary expenses in carrying out the Public
22 Health Service Act, as amended (42 U.S.C., ch. 6A)
23 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), and other Acts, includ-
24 ing expenses for active commissioned officers in the Reserve
25 Corps and for not to exceed two thousand eight hundred

1 commissioned officers in the Regular Corps; expenses in-

9 SALARIES AND EXPENSES, OFFICE OF THE COMMISSIONER

10 For expenses necessary for the Office of the Commis-
11 sioner of Welfare, \$1,062,000.

12 Grants to States, next succeeding fiscal year: For mak-
13 ing, after May 31 of the current fiscal year, payments to
14 States under titles I, IV, V, X, XIV, and XVI, respec-

16 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

17 For expenses necessary for the Office of the Secretary,

4 For expenses necessary for the National Labor Relations
5 Board to carry out the functions vested in it by the Labor-

7 141-167), and other laws, \$24,000,000: *Provided*, That
8 no part of this appropriation shall be available to organize
9 or assist in organizing agricultural laborers or used in
10 connection with investigations, hearings, directives, or
11 orders concerning bargaining units composed of agricul-

6 section 3 of the Railway Labor Act, as amended, at rates
7 not in excess of \$100 per diem; and emergency boards
8 appointed by the President pursuant to section 10 of said

1 TITLE VI—FEDERAL MEDIATION AND
2 CONCILIATION SERVICE
3 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

4 For expenses necessary for the Service to carry out the
5 functions vested in it by the Labor-Management Relations
6 Act, 1947 (29 U.S.C. 171-180, 182), including expenses
7 of the Labor-Management Panel as provided in section 205
8 of said Act; expenses of boards of inquiry appointed by the
9 President pursuant to section 206 of said Act; temporary
10 employment of arbitrators, conciliators, and mediators on
11 labor relations at rates not in excess of \$100 per diem; pur-
12 chase of one passenger motor vehicle (medium sedan for re-
13 placement only) at not to exceed \$3,000; and Government-

23 vance to the Interstate Commission on the Potomac River
24 Basin the Federal contribution toward the expenses of the
25 Commission during the current fiscal year in the administra-

1 tion of its business in the conservancy district established
2 pursuant to the Act of July 11, 1940 (54 Stat. 748),
3 \$5,000.

4 TITLE VIII—UNITED STATES SOLDIERS' HOME
5 LIMITATION ON OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE AND
6 CAPITAL OUTLAY

7 For maintenance and operation of the United States
8 Soldiers' Home, to be paid from the Soldiers' Home per-
9 manent fund, \$6,888,000: *Provided*, That this appropria-
10 tion shall not be available for the payment of hospitalization

12 rates in excess of those prescribed by the Secretary of the
13 Army, upon the recommendation of the Board of Commis-

15 TITLE IX—GENERAL PROVISIONS

16 SEC. 901. Appropriations contained in this Act, avail-
17 able for salaries and expenses, shall be available for services
18 as authorized by section 15 of the Act of August 2, 1946 (5
19 U.S.C. 55a) but at rates not to exceed ~~\$75~~ \$95 per diem for
20 individuals.

21 SEC. 902. Appropriations contained in this Act avail-
22 able for salaries and expenses shall be available for uniforms
23 or allowances therefor as authorized by the Act of September
24 1, 1954, as amended (5 U.S.C. 2131).

25 SEC. 903. Appropriations contained in this Act avail-

1 able for salaries and expenses shall be available for expenses
2 of attendance at meetings which are concerned with the func-
3 tions or activities for which the appropriation is made or
4 which will contribute to improved conduct, supervision, or
5 management of those functions or activities.

6 SEC. 904. The Secretary of Labor and the Secretary of
7 Health, Education, and Welfare, are each authorized to make
8 available not to exceed \$5,000 from funds available for
9 salaries and expenses under titles I and II, respectively, for
10 official reception and representation expenses.

11 SEC. 905. None of the funds appropriated in this Act
12 shall be used to conduct or assist in conducting any program
13 (including but not limited to the payment of salaries, admin-
14 istrative expenses, and the conduct of research activities) re-
15 lated directly or indirectly to the establishment of a national
16 service corps or similar domestic peace corps type of pro-
17 gram.

18 SEC. 906. *None of the funds contained in this Act shall*
19 *be used for implementing any provision of the Economic*
20 *Opportunity Act of 1964.*

21 This Act may be cited as the "Departments of Labor,
22 and Health, Education, and Welfare Appropriation Act,
23 1965".
