as follows:—

I. The first will be a visible and very remarkable Eclipse of the Sun, on the 3d of April;—The Moon being near her Apogee, her apparent Semidiameter will be less than that of the Sun,—it cannot be total but will be Annular, i. e. it will appear like a Gold Ring.—See the Type in the Title Page.

Beginning at 7 20 24 Mean Time, Middle at 8 51 17 in the End 10 22 10 Evening.

To keep arms, and other polished metals from rust....One ounce of camphire, two pounds of hog's lard; dissolve them together, and take off the scum; mix as much black lead as will bring them to an iron colour; rub your arms, &c. over with this, and let it lie on 24 hours; then clean them with a linen cloth, and they will keep clean many months.
