To keep arms, and other polifhed metals from ruft.---One ounce of camphire, two pounds of hog's lard; diffolve them together, and take off the foum; mix as much black lead as will bting them to an iron colour; rub your:arms, \&c. over with this, and let it lie on 24 hours; then clean them with a llinen cloth, and they will keep clean many months.
