



CHAPTER I.

OF ORDINARY MEETINGS.

1. THE ordinary meetings of the Society fhall commence the laft Saturday but one of October, and be held every Saturday until eight fets of members fhall have read their differtations. * Each ordinary meeting for private bufinefs fhall commence at fix o'clock P. M. and fhall not be protracted beyond feven. If the private bufinefs fhould not then be finifhed, it fhall be refumed either at the next ordinary meeting, or at an extraordinary one to be appointed for that purpofe \dagger . An adjournment of a few minutes A fhall

fhall take place after the private bufinefs, when the public bufinefs fhall commence, and continue until the meeting be diffolved by the Prefident.

2. The names of the ordinary attending members fhall be called over by the Secretary at the beginning of the private bufinefs, and at the beginning and end of public bufinefs. If any member be abfent from the roll-call at private bufinefs, he fhall be fined 1s. If from the first roll-call (public bufinefs) 6 d.; from the fecond 1s. The Prefident shall not give leave of abfence before ten o'clock. Any member may be at liberty to leave the Society after twelve P. M (inferting his name in a book provided for the purpofe), without the confent of the Prefident.

3. Any member may petition for leave of abfence from the meetings of the Society for a limited time, provided he be not to give in differtations within four weeks. During the permitted time of abfence, he shall not enjoy any of the privileges of a member. And if, after the expiration of this time, he should be abfent from three successive ordinary meetings, without a sufficient apology, he shall thereby incur the penalty of expulsion.

4. The Secretary shall, on every night of meeting, examine the lift of absentees; and if any honorary or extraordinary member, whole name may be on the lift of circulation, should have been absent three fucceflive nights, without a sufficient excuse, he shall not be permitted to receive the differtations and minutes the remainder mainder of that feffion : Nor shall he, in any future feffion, receive them, until he shall have petitioned the Society, and obtained permission. If an ordinary member should be absent from three successive ordinary meetings, without a sufficient excuse, he shall thereby incur the penalty of expulsion.

5. No perfor thall publith, or intentionally furnith any other perfor with materials for publithing, any of the transfactions of the Society without their authority. Any member infringing this law, thereby incurs the penalty of expulsion.

CHAP.

CHAP. II.

L A W S.

OF EXTRAORDINARY MEETINGS.

1. WHEN the Society may think an extraordinary meeting requifite, the Prefident in office thall appoint it within forty-eight hours, unlefs the member proposing it confent to its being later.

2. The roll fhall be called at the beginning and end of the meeting; and if any member is abfent at either roll-call, he fhall be fined 1 s. The following appeals to be confidered valid; confinement for one day by illnefs, engagements at other focieties, at claffes, abfence from town two miles or more.

3. The first Wednesday after the last ordinary meeting of each fession, there shall be an extraordinary meeting, for the purpose of collecting the money due to the Society.

4. The fucceeding Saturday there shall be another extraordinary meeting, for the purpose of receiving the report of the Committee, which shall have been appointed to examine the accounts of the Presidents *.

C H A P. III.

OF MONTHLY MEETINGS.

. A MEETING fhall be held on the first Friday of every month throughout the year, at feven o'clock in the evening, for the purpole of confidering fuch Medical or Philosophical differtations as any member may communicate to the Society. After the Society have made their remarks on them, they shall be left with the Printing Committee.

2. Every Prefident, and every ordinary member, who may be of the Printing Committee, if abfent from the firft roll-call, fhall be fined 6 d.; if from the fecond, 4s. 6 d. The fecond roll not to be called until fifteen minutes after the meeting is conftituted.

3: The Printing Committee shall, within the space of ten days after their election, chuse one of their number to be Collector of the transactions of the Society for that year : And it shall be the duty of this Collector to prefent to the Society, at the first ordinary meeting after the 16th of November, a fair copy of such papers as he thinks merit publication, which come under the determination of the Committee. This manufcript to lie upon the table of the Library four weeks; and the 5

the Society shall then determine, by ballot, whether it be printed or not. If determined in the affirmative, the Collector is authorised to get them printed with all convenient speed, at the expence of the Society. When a volume is compleated, it is to be fold for account of the Society.

4. The Printing Committee fhall likewife have power to chufe and purchafe books for the Society.

5. This Committee fhall, at monthly meetings, give in a lift of books; which lift fhall remain in the Library (fo that any member of the Society may add whatever book he thinks proper, affixing his name to the propofal), until the laft ordinary meeting of the Society for that month, when the Prefident of the meeting fhall read over the title of every book comprized in the lift. After which, fuch books, as may be approved of by the Society, fhall be purchafed by the Committee.

6. No appeal for non-attendance can be admitted from the members of this Committee, except previous confinement by illness for two days, or absence from town for more than fix miles, and during two days.

7. All the transactions of the Printing Committee fhall be minuted in a book kept for that particular purpose: In which all the books approved of by the Society, every commission for particular books, and those which have been purchased by the Committee, shall be registered. And this book shall remain in the Library

of the Society for the information of every gentleman.

8. No member of the Committee fhall be permitted to tranfact bufinefs with any Bookfeller whatever, unlefs an order for that purpofe be previoufly inferted in the minute-book of the Committee: And when commiffions for books are granted to Bookfellers, which cannot be procured in Edinburgh, a letter from the Bookfeller, acknowledging the commiffion, fhall be obtained.

9. A difcretionary power is vefted in the Committee for the purchafing of new publications; which they again fhall delegate to two of their number, in rotation, from one monthly meeting till another. These two gentlemen fhall exercise the difcretionary power vested in them for the purchase of such books, by written orders figned by them; which order must be fent along with the books to the Library of the Society, and the Secretary be directed to preferve them.

10. The Bookfellers shall be directed to fend the books which are purchased from them to the Library of the Society, at an hour when the Secretary will attend, who is to grant receipts for them, and minute the date of these receipts, fo that it may appear that they came into the Library of the Society the fame day they were fent from the Bookfeller.

11. The receipts of the Secretary shall be the documents by which the Booksellers shall authenticate their 8

their accounts when they prefent them to the Society; and if the date of the receipt do not correspond with the date of the purchase, the account shall not be admitted.

12. For better enforcing that law, which determines that one-third of the großs revenue of that Society be appropriated to the Library, the Treafurer shall be directed to carry over the ordinary expences of one year to the ordinary expences of the fucceeding; and, without a repeal of this law, it shall not be lawful for him to pay any accounts of the Society from the funds allotted to its Library, except those which belong to the Library itself. This law cannot be repealed, at any meeting of the Society, unless fix extraordinary and 30 ordinary members are present who do confent to its repeal.

CHAP. IV.

OF THE PRIZE QUESTION.

1. THE Society fhall, annually, on the *i*ft day of January, propofe an experimental queftion, connected with the objects of their inftitution; and a medal, value 20 guineas, fhall be given on the firft day of meeting in April, two years and three months afterwards, to the author of the beft differtation on that fubject, if fuch differtation be judged to have fufficient merit. Differtations, (written in Latin, Englifh, or French), muft be fent to the fecretary of the printing committee, on or before the 1ft day of January, two years fucceeding the publication of the advertifement.

2. Each effay muft be accompanied with a fealed letter, and motto on its outfide, corresponding to that prefixed to the effay, and fealed with a fimilar feal. The author must mention in this letter his name and place of abode. The other effays to be burnt, or returned, if required, with the letters unopened.

3. The determination of the refpective merits of the differtations shall be vested folely in the Printing Committee.

4. The differtations fhall circulate amongft the members of the Printing Committee. They fhall be fent firft to the oldeft member of the Committee, who, after he has perufed them, fhall fend them to the next, in the order of feniority; and fo on, in fucceffion, until all the members fhall have perufed them.

Every member shall form his opinion apart, with regard to the merits of the different essays; and conceal his fentiments, even from the other members of the Committee.

5. There shall be a box provided for the Committee. And, on the day appointed for the decision, each member shall put into this box a paper, without signature, containing his opinion.

6. The prize to be adjudged according to the opinions of the majority thus collected.

OF THE DECISIONS OF THE SO-CIETY.

t. WHEN any proposal shall be made to the Society, and seconded, if it be not unanimously agreed to, it shall be determined by ballot at the ensuing ordinary meeting.

2. The manner of balloting fhall be as follows : Every member who may not choose to vote, having retired, each remaining member shall receive a balloting ticket, which he shall put into the *admit* or *reject* fide of the balloting box. The Secretary shall then count the number of voters; and, if this be found by the President and two senior members present, (who shall always together examine the returns), to correspond with the number of balloting tickets in the box, the President shall announce the decision of the question, according to the proportion of tickets in the different fides.

3. A proposal for adopting a new regulation * shall be admitted by the concurrent suffrages of two thirds of

A petition for a feat in the Society fhall be admitted upon the following conditions : When the number of members voting fhall be below thirty, if there be not two negatives ; when the number voting fhall be thirty, or above thirty, if there be not for every ten votes one negative. A propolal for the admiffion of an honorary member fhall be admitted upon the fame conditions. A propolal for the admiffion of a visitor shall be admitted, if there be not two negatives. A petition for a certificate shall be admitted, by a majority of the Society. A petition for leave to alter the turn of delivering differtations shall be admitted, if there be not fix negatives.

3. The fenfe of the Society, collected from the fuffrages of a majority by ballot, fhall in all other cafes regulate their decifions.

CHAP. VII.

OF ORDINARY MEMBERS.

NO petition for an ordinary feat shall be received from any candidate who has not, for fix months, attended fome school of medicine. This attendance must be certified in the petition.

2. Every fuch petition fhall be prefented in due time, at an ordinary meeting, by fome one member, who fhall not be at liberty to make a recommendatory fpeech in favour of the candidate; but a written recommendation fhall be affixed to every fuch petition when it is prefented, containing an atteftation, upon honour, of the truth of the facts alledged in the faid petition; and fuch recommendation fhall be figned by no fewer than fix, and not more than twelve members. The fpirit of the following recommendation to be preferved. We the underwritten, members of the Royal Medical Society of Edinburgh, atteft, upon our honour, that the allegations contained in the petition are true. Moreover, that the petitioner has enjoyed the further advantage of attending medical lectures for years, or of fludying medicine for years; and that we know him perfectly qualified to become an ufeful member to the Society.

4. No petition shall be balloted for more than once the fame evening, unless on the discovery of a mistake in the ballot.

5. No petition shall be received from the fame candidate more than for three times the fame feffion.

6. Admiffions into the Society shall take place only between the 20th of November and 1st of May.

7. If any member promife his vote for or against a candidate, he shall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d.

8. A copy of the Laws shall be fent to each new elected member, by the perfon who shall have prefented his petition. The new elected member may fign the Laws (at the appointed time *) any of the three nights of ordinary meeting fucceeding his election, But, if he neglect to fign them the first night, he shall incur the penalty of a crown. If he continue his neglect the fecond night, he shall incur the penalty of another crown. And, if he continue his neglect the third night, he shall incur the penalty of expulsion.

9. The

9. Whatever member affumes to himfelf a title of the Society which he has not lawfully acquired, fhall be fined ten guineas, and fhall be obliged to relinquish the title he has affumed; or, by non-compliance with either of these, fhall be expelled.

CHAP. VIII.

OF EXTRAORDINARY MEMBERS.

1. A NY Member, after having written two fets of differtations, and difcharged all his debts due to the Society, fhall immediately become an Extraordinary Member.

2. A Doctor of Medicine, or a Fellow of the Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh, fhall become an Extraordinary Member at the end of that feffion in which he fhall have written one complete fet of differtations; providing he fhall have contributed fix guineas and an half (exclusive of fines and donations) to the funds of the Society fince his admiffion.

3. An Extraordinary Member shall enjoy all the privileges of an Honorary Member.

OF CORRESPONDING MEMBERS.

• A NY perfon who has fent fome communication to the Society, or has published his opinions in any other manner, may be proposed as a Corresponding Member. The proposal shall be circulated with the papers, and determined at the next ordinary meeting in the same way as a petition for an ordinary feat.

2. A corresponding member shall enjoy all the privileges of a perpetual visitor. In return for which, he shall communicate to the Society any observations or cases, that shall seem to him worthy of their attention.

3. The perfon who fhall have proposed a Corresponding Member, shall, after election, send him an account of his privileges and duty, accompanied with a diploma *.

OF HONORARY MEMBERS.

2. A NY perfon may be proposed as an Honorary Member. The proposal shall be circulated with the papers, and determined at the next ordinary meeting.

2. An honorary Member shall enjoy all the privileges of an Ordinary Member, except such as are otherwife particularly specified. He shall, besides, be excufed from writing differtations, attending meetings, and paying contributions.

3. If he receive the papers in circulation *, he fhall be fubjected to all those laws, from which he is not particularly exempted.

CHAP. XI.

OF PRESIDENTS.

t. ON the first ordinary meeting of the Society, after the 16th of November, (or on the 16th of November, if an ordinary meeting happen that day), the Prefident shall appoint the election of Annual Prefidents to take place at the next ordinary meeting.

2. Intimation of the appointment shall be circulated with the differtations and minutes.

3. Each Member shall be called upon, according to feniority, to deliver to the President a list of those for whom he may vote. A Committee shall then be appointed to examine the lists, and to bring in a written report of the names of the Members voted for, and of the number of votes for each. If a vacancy should occur in the office of President, during the Session, the fame order shall be followed in filling it up as at the annual election.

4. No member shall vote at the election, or be chofen Prefident, unless his name shall have been in the list of circulation for one week at least previous to the election.

5. No Extraordinary Member, whole name fhall not have been on the circulation for three weeks previous to the election of Prefidents, fhall be put on the circulation, unlefs he fignify his intention for that purpole to the Secretary by letter. And any member who fhall falfify fuch letter, fhall fuffer the penalty of expulsion.

6. The refolution of the Society, upon the 20th January 1787, (expreffing their fenfe with regard to the conduct of Extraordinary Members), fhall be read aloud from the chair, immediately before any election of Prefidents.

7. If, at the beginning of any meeting, all the annual Prefidents be abfent, the office of Prefident shall devolve on the fenior member prefent. But, if the Prefident whose turn it may be to prefide, have occasion to leave the chair, he may substitute in his place another annual Prefident; or, if none of the other annual Prefidents be prefent, any Member whom he may think proper.

8. The four Prefidents fhall officiate according to feniority. And, if the Prefident whole turn it may be to take the chair fhould be abfent at the hour of meeting, without having obtained another Prefident to officiate in his fread, he fhall be fined 1 fh.; and, if he fhould not appear during the whole bufinefs, he fhall be fined half a crown.

9. The Prefident, whole turn it may be to officiate at the public bufinels of any meeting, is to officiate at the private bufinels of the fucceeding ordinary meeting, and at all extraordinary meetings which may occur during the intervening week.

10. The Prefident fhall announce from the chair every vacancy which may occur in any office of the Society when it fhall have happened; or, if it happen in the middle of the week, at the enfuing ordinary meeting. He fhall take care that notice of it circulate in the minutes, and that it be filled up at the fucceeding ordinary meeting.

11. The Prefident in office fhall regulate the debates; for any irregularity during which he may impose a fine not exceeding 1 fh. If any perfonal, impolite, or diforderly expression, should occur during the debate, the Prefident shall immediately censure it. Should he be inattentive to this, any member may remind him of his duty, and (if necessary) may require him to take the opinion of the Society immediately. If the offending member refuse to make such concessions as the Society may judge proper, he shall thereby incur the penalty of expulsion. But if, after he shall have made such concesfions, any member should challenge him to a duel, that member shall thereby incur the penalty of expulfion.

12. Any member diffatisfied with the conduct of a Prefident, may accufe him. An extraordinary meeting ing fhall be appointed for judging the accufation. If the Society find the allegations juft, the Prefident fhall be depofed; if not, the accufer fhall incur the penalty of half a guinea.

OF THE TREASURER.

1. THE Treasurer shall receive all the money of the Society; and deburse none of it without its order. He is to continue in office as long as he shall faithfully perform his duty. If a vacancy happen in his office, the same form shall be observed in his election as in that of a President.

CHAP. XIII.

OF THE SECRETARY AND LIBRARIAN.

1. THE fame perfon thall act both as Secretary and Librarian. So long as he thall difcharge his duty faithfully, he thall receive L. 25 Sterling per annum.

2. The Secretary shall call over the names of the ordinary members, at the beginning and end of every ordinary meeting, and at the beginning and end of every extraordinary meeting, alfo, at the beginning and end of every monthly meeting, the names of the Prefidents, and of the four ordinary members who are of the Printing Committee.

3. At private bufinels, he shall read the minutes of the preceding night. At public bufinels, he shall read the case, question, and aphorism; but not the differtations on them.

4. He shall give to the President, every night at the private business, a list of the gentlemen who are to appoint visitors; also of those who give in differtations on that and the following night. And also, the names

of

m

of the gentlemen who are appointed to examine the circulation and periodical publications.

5. He shall write down all the transactions and minutes of the Society; and, at the end of each meeting, deliver such records to the President, to be inspected and figned by him. These minutes (transcribed into proper books), he shall afterwards deliver, together with the differtations received, to the senior member, every Sunday during the session, at eight o'clock in the morning.

6. He shall receive the differtations and minutes, after they shall have circulated among the members.

7. In balloting, he shall count the number of voters in the room; and carry round the balls and box.

8. He fhall, in a book kept for that purpofe, and which fhall be allowed to lie on the Library table, mark down the names of all those gentlemen, who may have been absent from any of the roll-calls; specifying the particular one, and the penalty incurred. He shall also mark down, in the same book, when ordered by the President, the names, offences, and penalties of any person, who may have transgressed any of the laws.

9. On the first ordinary meeting in March he shall deliver to the Committee, appointed for felecting subjects for differtation, the cases, questions, and aphorisms, given in by the members. After the lots have been drawn, he shall, within the space of a fortnight at farthest, transcribe into a book, to be kept in the Library for the infpection of the members, all the fets of papers, marking each fet with its proper number, and the name of the perfon, who is to write on the fubject it contains. He fhall, then, deliver to each perfon the original fet allotted to him. At the commencement of each feffion, he fhall hang up in the Library a lift, fpecifying the names of the authors for that year, and the fubjects of their differtations. If he tranfgrefs any regulation of the above law, he fhall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d. for each offence.

10. There shall be a book kept by the Secretary, in which he shall register, at the end of every meeting, the sum of money received during that meeting. To this account he shall assume, and deliver the book to the President who received the money, that it may be attested by him also.

11. If an extraordinary meeting be appointed, for the accufation of any member, the Secretary fhall give information of the day appointed, to the party accufing and the party accufed.

12. The Secretary (as Librarian), fhall have the fole charge of the Library, and fhall be accountable to the Society for every book that may be loft, for which no receipt flands in the book. If he refufe to make compensation, he shall be difinissed and profecuted.

13. The Librarian fhall not erafe the name of any book from the prefs-catalogue, unlefs by the defire and under under the infpection of a Committee appointed for the purpofe.

14. Whenever a book is added to the Library, the Librarian shall, within a week from the receipt of it, infert its name, &c. into the prefs-catalogue. For any infringement of this law, the Librarian shall incur the penalty of 6 d.

15. He fhall not intruft any member with the keys of the Library, or fuffer any one to take down, or put up books into the book-cafe.

16. He fhall attend at the Library every Monday, Wednefday, and Friday, between the hours of four and fix in the afternoon; for the purpose of giving out and receiving books from the members. After which hour he is not obliged to give out any books.

17. The Librarian fhall lend books to members only. He fhall take a receipt for every book, or books, lent out; which receipt fhall be inferted into a book kept for the purpofe, and figned by the member who takes out the books.

18. The Librarian fhall not allow any member to have out more than eight volumes from the Library at a time, except when a book confifts of a greater number of volumes; in which cafe, he may lend out the whole work.

19. When a book is returned, he fhall expunge it from the receipt-book immediately, under the penalty of five fhillings.

27.

20. On the first ordinary meeting in December, and also that in April, the Librarian shall intimate to every member who may have the Society's books in their possession of the society's order, that these books be returned before the next ordinary meeting. He shall give in to the Committee of fines, a list of those who neglect to obey that order. If he transgress this law, he shall incur the penalty of $5 \, \text{s}$.

21. During the recess, the Librarian shall give intimation, by letter, to the perfon who, in rotation, may be appointed to examine the publications lying on the Library table.

22. He fhall collect and preferve the periodical publications.

23. For every neglect of duty, not otherwife particularly specified, he shall incur the penalty of 2s. 6 d.

24. He shall attend Committees when ordered.

25. He shall not be permitted to speak in the Society as a member : But, if accused for neglect of duty, &c. when may (on petition) be allowed to answer in his own defence, as members, when accused.

26. The Society may difmifs the Secretary at pleafure, upon giving him intimation of their intention four weeks before; or immediately, upon paying him a month's wages from the time of his difmiffion.

27. He fhall not be allowed to refign his office, without giving the Society four weeks notice; during which time a Committee fhall be appointed to examine into the flate of the Library, to receive the keys, and fettle accounts with him.

C H A P. XIV.

OF VISITORS.

1. A T the private bufinefs of every ordinary meeting, the Prefident, whole turn it may be to officiate at the public bufinefs of the next ordinary meeting, and four members to be chosen by rotation, according to feniority, fhall appoint each one vifitor, to be admitted, if approved by the Society, at the public bufinefs of the enfuing ordinary meeting. If any member, whole turn it may be to appoint a vifitor, be abfent at the time for making the appointment, he fhall lofe his privilege, until it return to him again in rotation.

2. After the nomination of the vifitors, their names fhall be read; and if any objection fhould be made to any one, his admifion fhall be balloted for immediately.

3. The fame perfon fhall not be appointed a vifitor twice within one month.

4. Any perfon who may not remain in Edinburgh long enough to be appointed a vifitor in the ordinary manner may be proposed and admitted on the same night.

CHAP. XV.

1. UPON the first ordinary meeting in March, the Prefident shall order every ordinary member, and such other members as receive the books in circulation, to deliver to the Secretary, at the next ordinary meeting, the history of a case, a Medical or Philosophical question, and an Aphorism of Hippocrates, each to be written on a separate paper, and signed by the name of the person delivering them.

2. These papers shall be delivered to a Committee, who shall felect thirty-fix fets, confisting each of a case, question, and aphorism. If there shall not have been a fufficient number of proper subjects, the President shall appoint a second delivery, so that thirty-fix fets may be procured. Each of these being numbered, and sealed up in a separate cover, the whole shall, at the next ordinary meeting, be delivered by the Committee to the Secretary, together with a report, specifying the names

of

of the perfons whole papers may be contained in each of the numbered covers.

3. The fets of papers having been thus returned, the Prefident fhall order that every perfon, intending to write the enfuing feffion, fhall, at the next meeting, declare (in perfon, or by letter), his intention. Each of the thirty-fix fenior members, who intend to write, fhall then from numbers, on flips of papers, correfponding with those marked in the feveral fets, draw one.

4. After the lots fhall have been drawn, the Secretary fhall, within the fpace of a fortnight at fartheft, transferibe into a book, to be kept in the Library for the infpection of the members, all the fets of papers, marking each fet with its proper number, and the name of the perfon who is to write upon the fubjects of it. He fhall then deliver to each perfon the original fet allotted to him. And at the commencement of the enfuing feffion fhall hang up in the Library the names of those members who are to write, and the fubjects of their refpective differtations.

5. Any perfon may write on the fubjects given in by himfelf, provided they shall have met with the approbation of the Committee, and that he shall have (in writing) fignified his intention at the time of delivering in his set. After the subjects shall have been thus difposed of, by lot or choice, any perfon who shall make any alteration, or alterations, in them, shall be fined 5 s. for each. 6. The Prefident, Secretary, or any member, who may have transgreffed any of the laws, for providing fubjects for differtations, fhall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d. for each offence.

CHAP. XVI.

OF THE DELIVERY OF DISSERTATIONS.

N the first Friday in October, the Prefident 1. shall order the three fenior ordinary members, then refident in Edinburgh, to deliver to the Prefident, on the last Saturday but one of October, each a differtation on one of the fubjects allotted to him : The fenior, one on his cafe ; the fecond, one on his queftion; and the third, one on his aphorifm. On the Saturday following, the fenior, one on his queftion; the fecond, one on his aphorifm; and the third, one on his cafe. On the Saturday following, cach his remaining differtation. The Prefident in office shall order the fucceeding members, in fets of three, according to feniority, to deliver differtations in the fame order. Any member coming to Edinburgh, after his turn of writing shall have been past, must be confidered as the fenior member of the next fet.

2. The first fet of writers having, according to the above law, delivered their differtations on the last Saturday but one of October, the Society shall difcuss them them on the fecond Saturday of November. During the immediate time, the Secretary fhall, in the courfe of the first week, have the differtations transcribed into books to be kept for that purpose; and, on the following Sunday, shall deliver them, at eight o'clock in the morning, to the fenior member on the list of circulation, that they may circulate amongs the members.

3. The books in which thefe differtations shall have been transcribed, shall lie on the table in the Library, for the inspection of the members. Any perfon who may remove them from the Medical Hall shall be fined half-a-guinea.

4. Every fet of writers shall deliver their differtations to the President, three weeks before they are to be difcussed, in order that they may be transcribed the first week, and may circulate the remaining fortnight.

5. Should the perfon, appointed to write, neglect to give in his differtation at the frated time, he fhall incur the penalty of 6 d. for every hour of neglect, until his fine fhall amount to half-a-guinea. If he totally neglect to give in a differtation, on the night appointed for the difcuffion of it, he fhall, in addition to the above, incur the penalty of half-a-guinea for the first offence; of one guinea for the fecond; and of expulsion for the third. Sicknefs fhall, in no cafe, be deemed a valid excufe, unlefs the perfon fhall have been confined for two weeks previous to the time appointed for giving in his differtations to be transferibed.

CHAP. XVII.

OF THE CIRCULATION OF MINUTES AND DISSERTATIONS.

• A Sufficient number of copies of differtations fhall be procured, at the expence of the Society, fo that every member may receive them in circulation.

2. The differtations and minutes shall circulate among the members, according to feniority, unless any two agree to change their times of receiving them for mutual convenience. No member is to keep them longer than fix hours. Any perfon detaining one or more of the papers beyond the time appointed for fending them away, shall be fined 6 d. for each hour.

3. The Secretary shall begin the circulation every Sunday, during the fession, at eight o'clock in the morning, by fending the differtations and minutes to the fenior member whose name may be on the list of circulation. This member shall fend them to the next in rotation at the hour appointed,—he to his, and so on. If any person detain them more than fix hours beyond the time at which he ought to have fent them away,

he

he shall not fend them to the next on the list, but to him whose right it may then be to have them. And every perfon is to fend the differtations and minutes, at the appointed time, whether they shall have been six hours in his possession or not.

4. If the differtations and minutes be delivered at the abode of any member later than the hour appointed for him to have fent them away, he fhall not incur a penalty, though they fhould happen to be detained; but he must endeavour to fet the circulation right as foon as possible.

5. A book fhall circulate with thefe, in which fhall be inferted the names, and places of abode, of thofe members who are to receive the differtations and minutes, and the time allotted to each for the perufal of them. In another part of the fame book, each member fhall mark, in proper columns, 1. The name of the perfon from whom he may have received the differtations and minutes. 2. The hour at which he may have received them. 3. The name of the perfon to whom he may fend them. 4. The hour at which he may fend them. 5. His own name.—For every irrégularity, or omiffion, in marking the circulation, he fhall incur the penalty of 6 d.

CHAP. XVIII.

OF THE READING OF DISSERTA-TIONS.

1. THE Secretary shall, at public business, read the fubjects of differtation from the book in which they shall have been transcribed *. Then the member whose turn it may be shall read his own differtation; in failure of which, he shall incur the penalty of 2 sh. 6 d.

2. If any author be ablent during the discussion of his paper for more than a quarter of an hour, he shall incur the penalty of 5 s. The President shall notice whatever time he may be absent.

CHAP. XIX.

OF THE LIBRARY.

*• S UCH periodical publications, relating to philofophy or medicine, as a committee to be appointed for that purpose may approve of, shall be purchased.

2. The laft number of these publications shall be laid upon the Library table, and shall not be removed from the Medical Hall, until a succeeding one appear. Any perfon who may remove, or in any way abuse, one of these publications, shall incur the penalty of 5 s.

3. When a new periodical publication fhall appear, the former fhall either be bound immediately, if it be fufficiently large; or be laid afide until a number, deemed fufficient for that purpofe, by the Librarian and Treafurer, be collected. Each particular book fhall then be entered into the Library Catalogue, and lent out under the common regulations of the Library *.

4. At every ordinary meeting of the Society, the Prefident fhall appoint, in rotation, one of the ordinary members to report, in writing, at the following ordinary meeting, what publications may at that time be upon

upon the Library Table. At the laft ordinary meeting of the feffion, and at each monthly meeting during the recefs, the Prefidents shall appoint, in rotation, one of the ordinary members refiding in Edinburgh to give in, at the fucceeding monthly meeting, a fimilar report. During the recefs, the Secretary shall give notice, by letter, to the perfon upon whom the appointment may have fallen. Should the Prefident, Secretary, or Member appointed, fail to obferve what this law preferibes, he shall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d.

5. At the first ordinary meeting in December, and alfo at that in April, the Prefident shall order all the books of the Society to be returned before the ensuing ordinary meeting. Of this order, the Secretary shall give notice to each member who may at that time have any of the Society's books in his possession. If any member neglect to obey this order, the Librarian shall, on the third ordinary meeting, report his name to the Society; should the President, Librarian, or any member, fail to observe what this law prescribes, he shall incur the penalty of 5 s.

6. A box fhall be kept in the Library, in which fhall be deposited the great anatomical plates, and such other books as the Society may order. The key shall be lodged with the Janitor, and access granted to the members every day, from eight in the morning till eight at night. These books shall not be lent out, nor is the Librarian to be accountable for them.

7. No member shall cause a book belonging to the Society to be taken farther than two miles from Edinburgh, under the penalty of 10 s. 6 d. for each book.

8. If any member neglect or refuse to give up a book at the request of another member, after it shall have been fourteen days in his possession, he shall incur the penalty of 1 s. for each day he may continue to detain it.

9. At the end of every feffion fhall be printed a feparate catalogue of the books added that feffion, containing the names of the books, with those of the places and times of their publication annexed, disposed (as in the former printed catalogues), in alphabetical order.

CHAP. XX.

OF COMMITTEES.

i. THE Printing Committee shall confist of fixteen members, two of whom shall be Secretaries. The four Annual Presidents shall be of this Committee by office. Of the other members, three shall be chosen from the Royal College of Physicians, three from the Royal College of Surgeons, four from amongst those members whose names may be on the lift of circulation, and two (who are to officiate as Secretaries) from amongst members refident in Edinburgh.

2. This Committee shall be elected annually, on the first ordinary meeting after the election of Presidents.

3. The Committee of Fines shall confist of nine members, namely, the four Annual Prefidents, and the five eldeft ordinary members.

4. This Committee fhall meet by themfelves every Monday during the feffion at noon. They fhall determine, by ballot, every queftion that may arife with re-

fpect to the validity of appeals * from fines. And each member fhall be understood to have pledged his honour that he will not divulge what may pass among them.

5. If any member of this Committee be abfent at the time of meeting, he shall incur the penalty of 6 d. If he neglect to attend during any part of the meeting, he shall incur the penalty of 1 sh.

6. All Committees for examining accounts must confist of the four Annual Prefidents, the Treasurer, and five ordinary members.

7. At the laft ordinary meeting of the Society, in every feffion, a Committee fhall be appointed to examine the accounts of the Annual Prefidents. This Committee fhall make their report to the Society at the fecond extraordinary meeting after the close of the feffion.

8. At the first ordinary meeting in January, a Committee shall be appointed to examine the Treasurer's accounts.

9. At the flated periods + for giving in the books of the Society, a Committee fhall be appointed to infpect the Library.

10. On the Saturday previous to the election of Prefidents, a Committee fhall be appointed to examine the Lift of Circulation.

13. The Committee appointed for the impofition of fines shall be authorised to collect them in the following manner: On the first meetings of the above Committee, in the months of November, January, and March, the Committee shall direct the Secretary to transmit to every gentleman a written account of his fines; and, before the next meeting of the Committee, each member of the Society fo written to shall pay to the Secretary the full amount of his fines, under the penalty of 2s. 6d.

12. The Prefidents shall receive this money from the Secretary at the next meeting of the Committee, and shall account for it, in the usual manner, to the Treafurer.

13. In cafes where any member of the Society defires to make an appeal, he fhall intimate his intention before the next meeting of the Committee, by a written reply to the note he received from the Secretary; and, if the appeal be not fuffained, the appellant fhall incur the penalty of 5 s.

14. If any gentleman, thus applied to, fhall not anfwer the note from the Secretary, within fourteen days after the receipt of it, the Committee fhall report the conduct of fuch gentleman to the Society, under the penalty of 2 s. 6 d. from each of its members.

15. If a Committee be thought neceffary for any purpofe, except printing the transactions of the Society, and adjusting the fines, the proposer of the motion, for the execution of which the Committee may be thought

thought neceffary, shall be nominated by the Prefident to be chairman of the Committee. The chairman shall then nominate a fecond member, the fecond a third, and fo on, till the Committee be completed.

16. The Committee shall give in their report in writing at the appointed time *, on the enfuing night of meeting, and be then diffolved, if the contrary be not specified.

17. The Prefident in office may attend as a member of any Committee.

1. IN a book which shall be laid on the Library table, the Secretary shall mark the offences and penalties of each perfon who may transgress any of the laws.

3. No excufes for non-attendance can be deemed valid, except two days confinement, or two days absence from town,

C H A P. XXII.

OF THE COLLECTION OF MONEY.

t. E ACH member, upon figning the Laws of the Society, fhall pay to the Prefidents five guineas for the funds. He fhall be entitled for this to a copy of the Laws, and fhall be confidered as having paid his first year's fubscription of one guinea to the Library.

2. At the first ordinary meeting in December annually, each ordinary member, provided it is the fecond feffion of attendance, shall pay one guinea; if the third feffion 10 s. 6 d.

3. There shall be a book kept by the Secretary, in which he shall register the fines, confirmed by the Committee for that purpose. Upon payment of each of these fines, the President shall annex to the account of it his signature. There shall also be another book kept by the Secretary, in which he shall register, at the end of every meeting, the sum of money received during that meeting. To this account, the President receiving the money, and the Secretary, shall annex their fignatures. LAWS:

C H A P. XXIV.

OF EXPULSION.

1. A NY Member, diffatisfied with the conduct of another, may accufe him. An extraordinary meeting shall be appointed for judging of the accufation.

2. Intimation of the day appointed shall be delivered in writing, by the Secretary, to the party accused.

3. The party accufing, and the party accufed, (unlefs they obtain leave from the Prefident), shall be allowed to speak only twice upon the subject, the accuser beginning; after this, the parties shall withdraw, until called for.

4. After the parties shall have retired, the President shall ask the opinion of the Members upon the subject. No one shall speak more than twice, unless he obtain leave from the President. The accusation shall then be determined by ballot.

5. If the fende of the Society be in favour of it, the accused Member shall incur the penalty of expulsion. If not, the accuser shall be fined 105. 6.

6. If the Member accufed do not appear in his own defence, or do not fend a valid excufe, he shall thereby incur the penalty of expulsion.

7. No accufed Member shall be permitted to refign his feat, until the accufation be decided.

CHAP.

LAWS,

CHAP. XXV.

OF NEW LAWS.

1. ON the first ordinary meeting in February, the Prefident shall appoint an extraordinary meeting, to be held in the course of the third fucceeding week, for receiving proposals for making or repealing Laws. Each of these proposals shall circulate with the other papers of the Society, and shall be confidered at another extraordinary meeting, to be held in the course of the fucceeding week. If the proposal be rejected, the proposer shall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d.

2. At the giving in of a proposal, none but the member giving it in shall speak concerning it. At the discussion of its merits, he shall not speak more than twice; any other member more than once, unless permitted by the President.

3. The Society may, in any part of the feffion, make new *Regulations*, which shall have the force of laws, until the fucceeding extraordinary meeting in February, and no longer. If any proposal for a new regulation be rejected, the proposer shall incur the penalty of 2 s. 6 d.

CONDITION PRIOR TO TREATMENT

There was no cover. There were remains of the leather spine. The sewing was intact. The laid paper text was flexible, and slightly soiled, although the first and last leaf were moderately soiled and have tears. There were library stamps in the text. The surface pH of the text was 4.8.

TREATMENT

The text block was disbound, after the spine was softened with methyl cellulose poultices. The first and last leaves and heavily soiled leaves were surface cleaned with grated and solid white vinyl erasers. The text was washed in calcium enriched deionized water and deacidified in magnesium bicarbonate (1M solution in water). The leaves were repaired with hand made Japanese paper and wheat starch paste. The last two pages were reinforced with handmade Japanese paper and methyl cellulose. The book was resewn by hand with unbleached Irish linen thread with the addition of new end leaves of handmade paper. The spine was lined with both Japanese paper using wheat starch paste, and unbleached Irish linen with PVA adhesive. The book was recovered in a non-adhesive paper cover reinforced with acid-free buffered board. The surface pH after treatment was 8.8.
