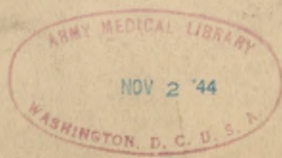

P R E F A C E

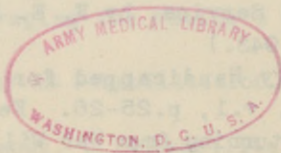

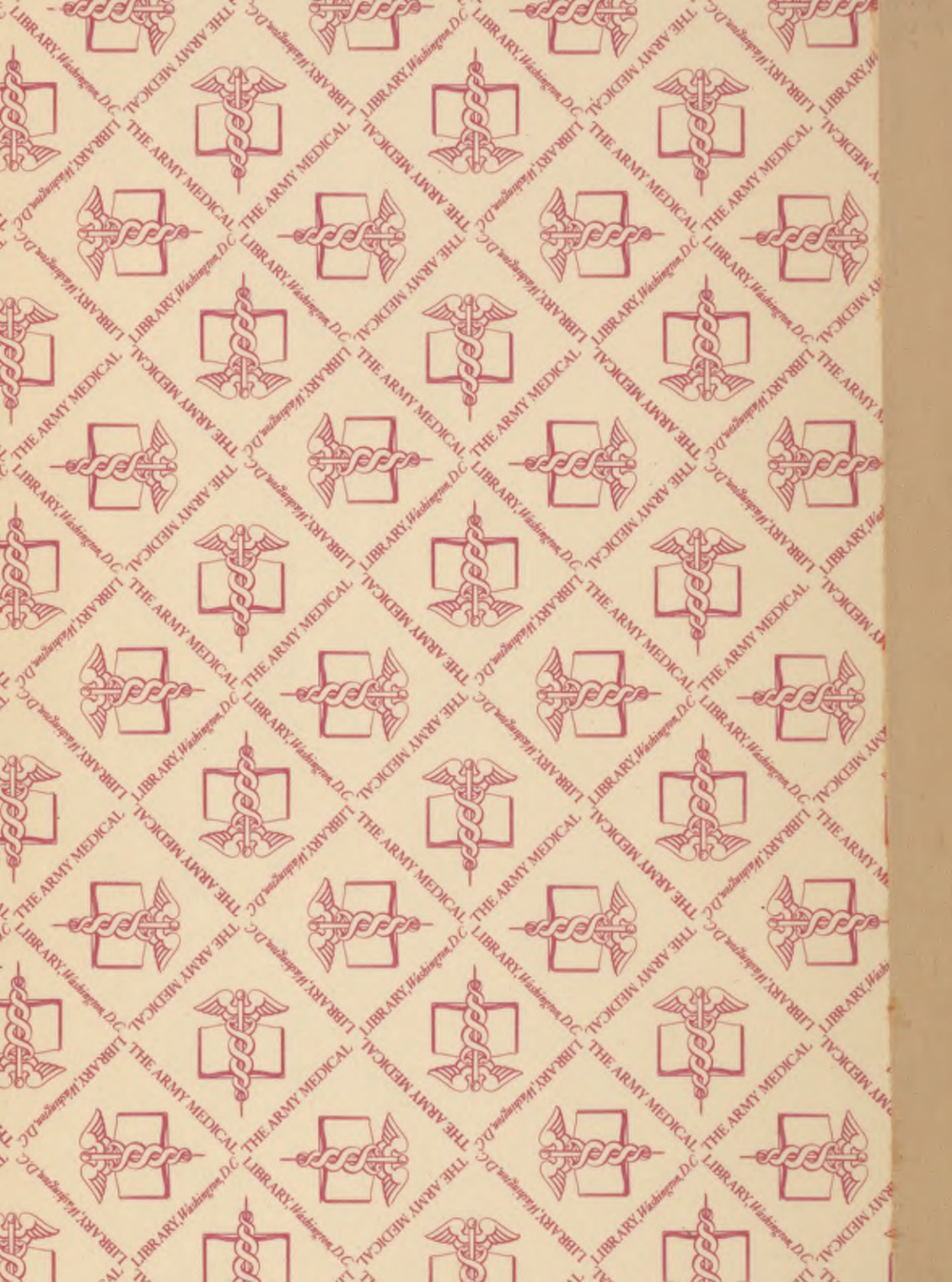
