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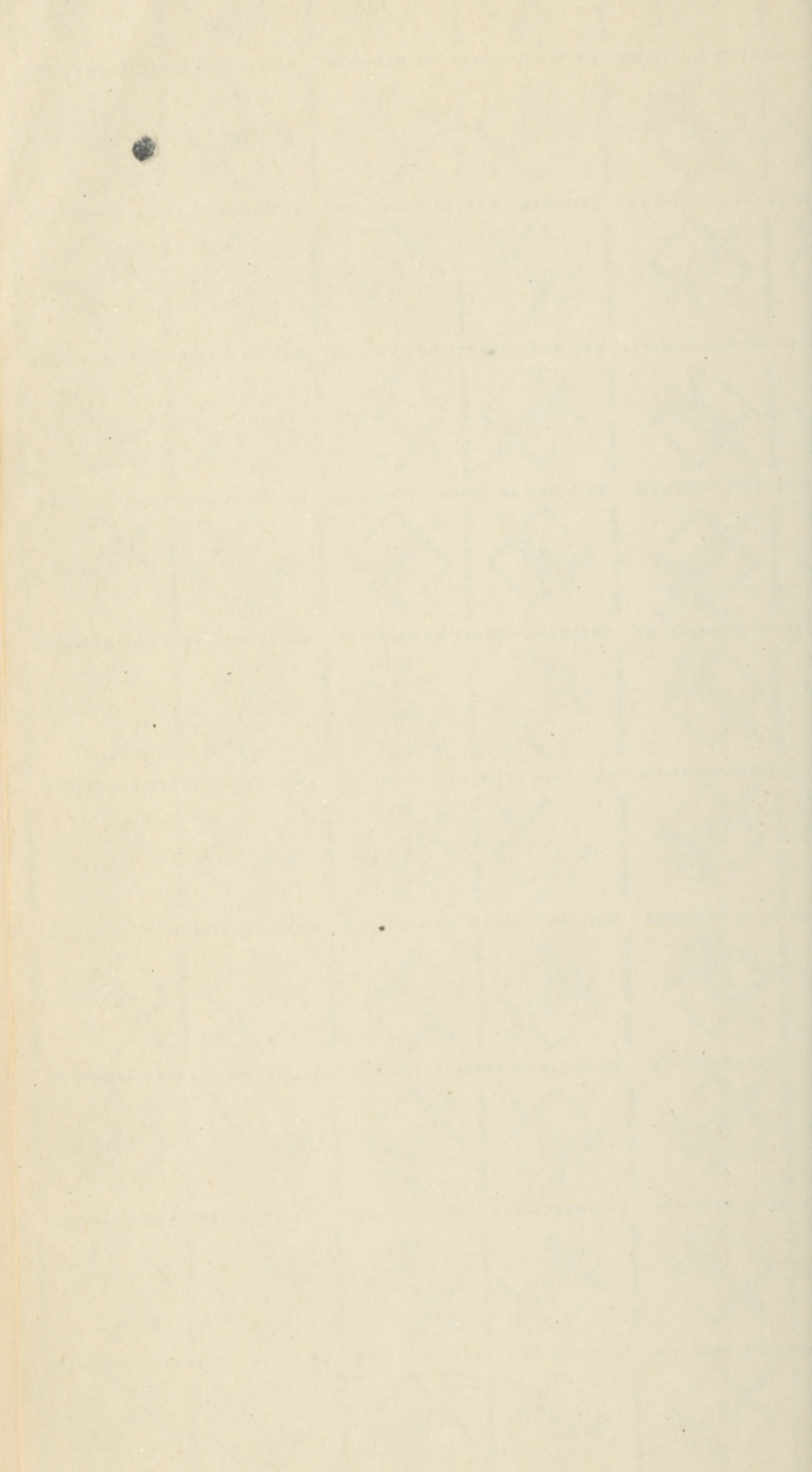

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P R E F A C E.

THE following work was commenced in October, 1867, the author, a graduate of the U. S. Military Academy, feeling the injustice of having the services of graduates, alone, made a matter of history, while ignoring the deeds of those who, equally with themselves, fought to sustain the Government in its hour of trial. This record, it was considered, would be of more interest to the officer's family and friends than to himself, and the interest therein would increase as time separated the actor from events so pregnant with glorious deeds, and would console him with the reflection that in dying, he had something more to leave behind him, for his children's children to delight in, than the casualties embraced in the last Army Register. No hesitation was felt in asking each officer for his record, as it was thought that the furnishing of the data of public duties performed, known only to the officer himself, would not be trespassing upon his modesty. Indulgence is claimed for such variations and omissions as may be observed, it having been found impossible to modify, the original records furnished, or—in all cases—to get correct

data. A second volume is contemplated should a sufficient number of records be received. The author regrets that he has been unable to obtain those of a large number of officers who were killed or died in service, but trusts that their friends will now aid him in doing so.

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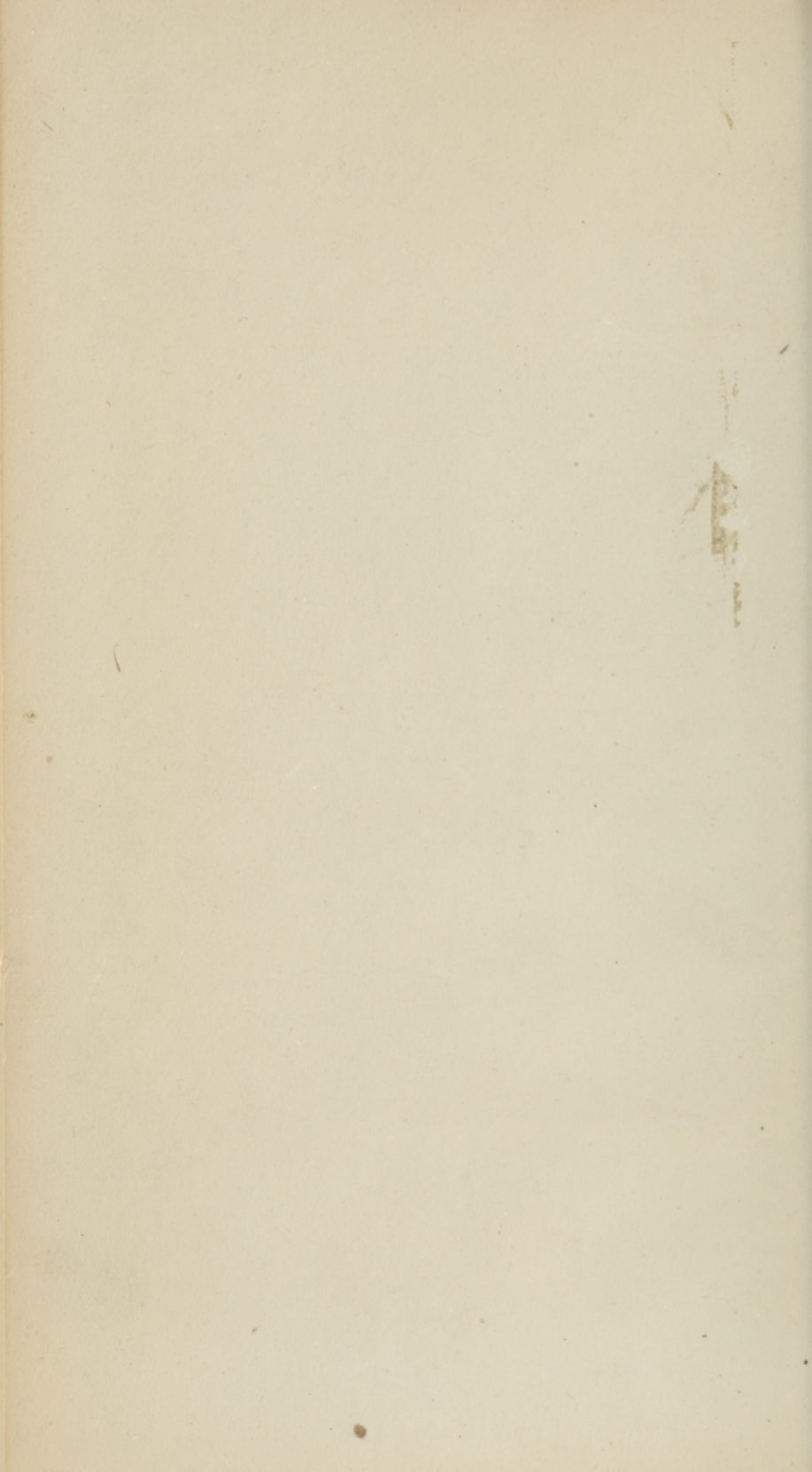
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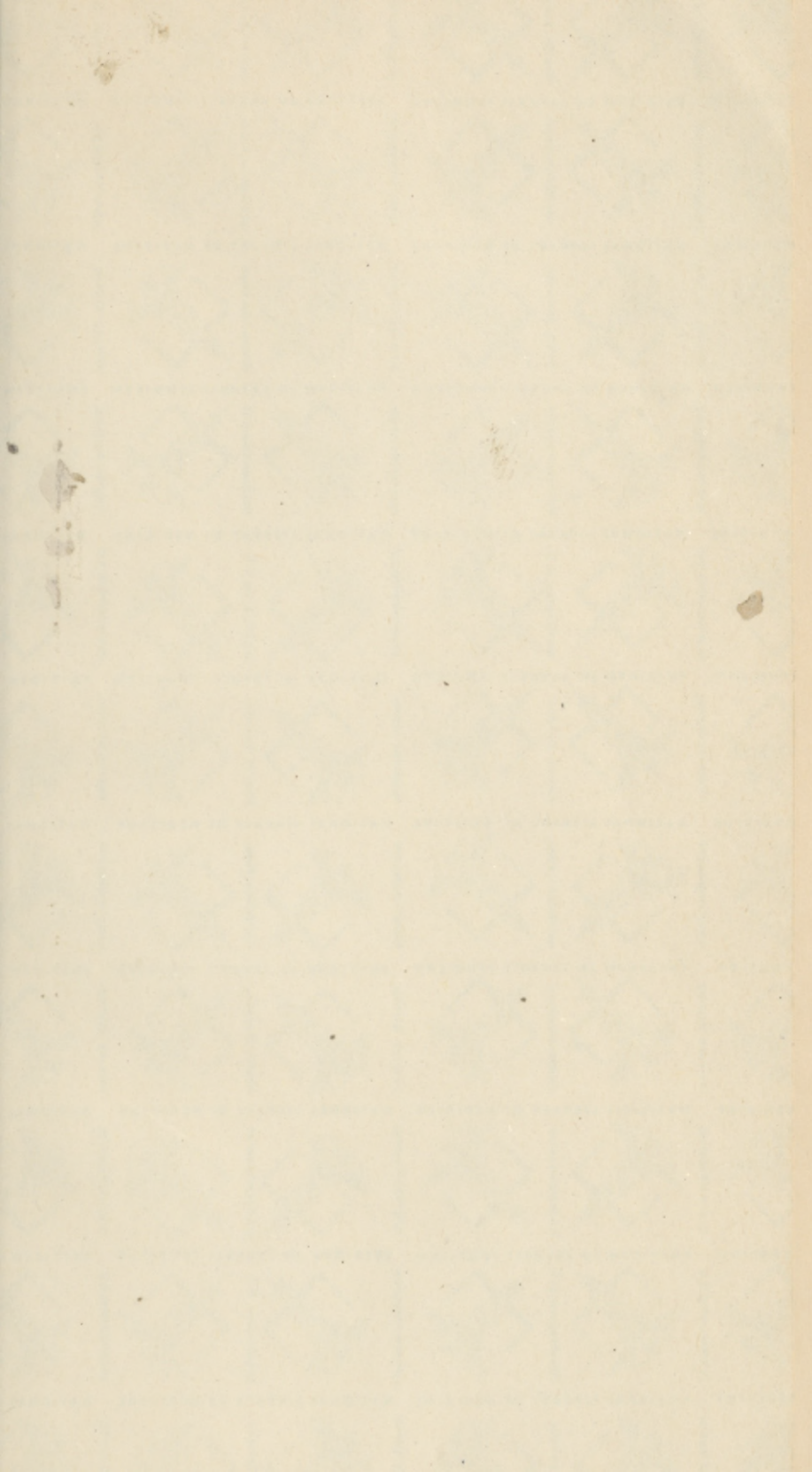
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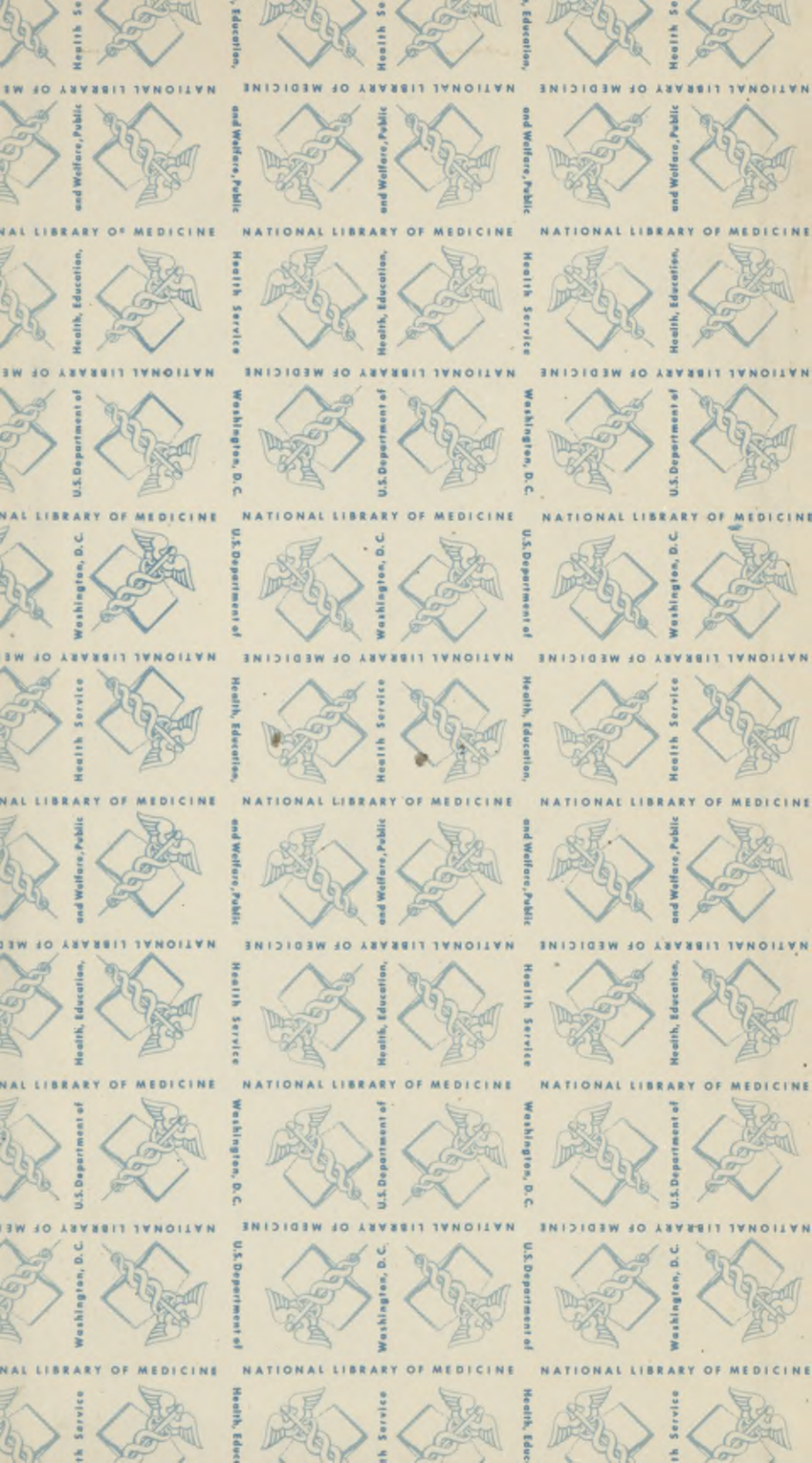
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
