Medical Panel Taking Stand For Ogden

A panel of medical experts, including one who has frequently denounced public "hysteria" about narcotics, prepared today to testify in the defense of Dr. Frank N. Ogden, 61-year-old Bal-timore physican charged with prescribing drugs "in bad faith."

Dr. Ogden has admitted prescribing drugs for known drug addicts, but says he did it "to maintain them and keep from becoming community prob-lems."

The State has produced evidence to show that the former Fire Department surgeon and widely known general practitioner provided a continuing supply of morphine and dolophine, a synthetic drug, to men with a history

of heroin or opium addiction.

Dr. Kolb Testifying.

Among the experts on hand to testify in Dr. Ogden's defense is Dr. Laurence Kolb, formerly of the United States Public Health Service, who has long argued that narcotics addicts must be treated as sick patients rather than as eriminals.

In a national magazine article he has contended that the dope problem has been oversensationalized an dthat the "hysteria" about
